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

**ABOUT CCR&R**

The first five years are a critical time of growth and development, and families are children's first and most important teachers. High quality early childhood care and education gives children the experiences they need to enter school ready to succeed while providing parents the opportunity to work and support their families. This guide provides information, resources, and guidance to help you make the best decision when choosing high quality child care and education programs that meet the needs of your family.

### **Best Beginning STARS to Quality Program:**

A voluntary quality rating improvement system that aligns quality indicators with support and incentives for early childhood programs and professionals. This quality improvement program promotes strong early childhood education in Montana.
