	Is the program licensed or registered?	
	May I have a copy of your policies?	
	Do the policies include schedules and fees?	
	What is your sick child policy?	
	Do you offer any financial assistance?	
	Do you have an orientation for new families?	
	What are your procedures for emergencies?	
	Do you practice fire drills and evacuations?	
	Are all staff trained in CPR and First Aid?	
	Do you Background Check ALL staff?	
	What is your system for knowing where my child is at all times?	
	Do you participate in the USDA sponsored Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP)?	
	How does the program support children's education and learning?	
	Are children able to choose what activities they want to do and who to play with?	
	Do the children help plan activities?	
	How do you accommodate children with special needs?	
Warning Signs	All parent visits must be planned in advance There are too many children for adequate care and supervision	
	There are few planned activities or guidance Caregivers are physically rough, abusive or yell at the children	
	The child care is not licensed or registered There are licensing deficiencies for Health and Safety requirements
